And, we'd like to suggest that you flip through your books before donating them, as each year we find a wide variety of items that have been left in books, such as photographs, love letters, birthday checks from Grandma (from 1986), mortgage statements, post cards, bookmarks, etc.

Finally, please remember that donations will be accepted throughout the summer, from July 5th to August 26th – but please don't bring your books after the Library has closed for the day, as books left outside are likely to be damaged by rain or the sprinkler system.

Thank you in advance for your lovely book donations, and see you at the Book Sale in September!

## FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

We continue progress toward realizing well-thought-out plans for transforming the Library to serve the community's 21st century needs. As the community has learned more about the project, residents increasingly appreciate that the tired home of our beloved community library - a vibrant center for cultural, intellectual and community gatherings as well as for reading and learning - simply cannot meet alsogrowing programmatic demands.

#### We Hear You

Since presenting the Schematic Design Report (Option A) to the Trustees in October 2015, we have benefitted from extensive conversations with Village Trustees and staff, community groups, and many, many residents. In addition to tremendous community enthusiasm for the design plan, we have heard: a) interest in understanding the decision-making process that brought us to this point, including the Library's consideration of design alternatives; and b) a desire to reduce the costs and review the project scope, based on sensitivity to other competing Village needs and residents' tax burden. Your feedback has been invaluable - and we hear you!

#### **Project Priorities**

With this valuable community feedback, we looked closely for project economies that would not impair program goals. Following intensive work with our architects, we have succeeded in identifying substantial cost savings, while still prioritizing space usage, program flexibility, accessibility, technology support, and environmental responsibility.

#### Finding Savings

Detailed design decisions lie ahead, of course, but with the changes we've made, we are now able to propose that the Village Trustees support this project ("Option A-1") with a \$8.4 million capital project bond - down 30% from the previous proposal - in order to optimize this 'dig-once' construction opportunity, reduce pressure on the Village operating budget and give Scarsdale the community resource it sorely needs.

How do we achieve this reduction? Project savings identified by the Library team through Option A-1 reduce construction costs by \$3 million from the Option A plan presented in October 2015, without too significant a compromise to programmatic goals. A reduced budget for adaptations to the Supply Field building, which will provide permanent benefit to the Village, can be largely covered by an anticipated State reimbursement grant and therefore adds only \$200,000 to project overhead, not the \$1 million initially anticipated. The resulting total community funding needed for the project is further offset by operating cost reductions during temporary Library relocation, projected at approximately \$1.5 million. The resulting \$8.4 million bond we now propose - which includes \$4.5 million already committed for long-deferred maintenance and would produce an estimated annual tax share of approximately \$118 for 15 years for a household with a 2015 average assessment of \$1.5 million – would offer the "right size" renovation to make the facility accessible, flexible and ready for the future.

#### **Private Support**

We have already raised more than \$2 million in gifts and pledges from generous community residents, and we remain optimistic that many other individuals and families will also support the project, enabling us to reach the \$7.5 million fundraising target we've set as the "private" component of this public-private partnership. With this anticipated private generosity and the parity achieved by a Village commitment to the \$8.4 million bond we propose, Scarsdale will have a village gem ready for the 21st century.

#### Join us!

We encourage you to continue learning about the project - a comprehensive informational binder with details about the alternatives considered and decision-making process that brought us to this point, the new project modifications and the revised project budget is available for your review at the Library, and we anticipate "live" explanatory presentations as well. Of course we are happy to address your questions. We hope that, as you continue to learn more about the project, you'll communicate to the Village Board your enthusiasm for the municipal support that will permit the enhancement of our community treasure.

## FROM THE REFERENCE DESK

We often hear that technology is a threat to libraries - that if people can get what they need online they will not come to the library. Spending a few minutes behind our desk casts serious doubt on this idea. We are confident promoting our E-LIBRARY to our patrons after they have stopped to look at our numerous displays for ideas on what to read next and then ask us about our program offerings featured within those displays. With this in mind, we are pleased to announce two new ways for our community members to read, watch and listen while travelling or relaxing at home, but also read on because we have other reasons to come in and spend some time with us.

In October, we launched the 3M Cloud Library. This intuitive platform allows access to popular books and audiobooks, from a multitude of genres, with the tap of a finger. Enter your library information and begin setting up your preferences, from legal to dystopian to contemporary women, select your sub categories so that your interests determine a browse ready collection, or check out the featured section for more general browsing and of course there is a search option. Other features include the ability to flag items to check out later, place holds and save your history. Five items can be checked out at a time and will be deleted automatically on expiration.

In April, we introduced Biblioboard, a mobile library containing curated collections running from classics to writings and artifacts from abolitionism in the United States to baking and beekeeping. For this year, we added a Riptide Publishing module, Psychotherapy.net and the National Film Board of Canada's Award Winning Films. Last but in no way least, is SELF-e. The SELF-e submission platform allows our patrons and local writing community to submit indie-published books, which are then shared with our library as well as others throughout New York state and potentially nationally through SELF-e Select. This service is free. All that is required is a great story and the ebook file.

Over the last 6 months, we have added engaging programs to an already rich array. We chose programs that we feel promote a sense of community. These include Adult Coloring, Paint Night at the Library, and a smaller book group Words Around the World to complement Nancy's highly successful book discussion group. Patrons were very happy to find that they did not need innate artistic talent to participate in Paint Night at the Library, and we have a dedicated group of coloring aficionados who are most welcoming to newcomers. In March, we worked with the Children's Department and partnered with the Lighthouse Guild and the Jewish Braille Institute to host a presentation on services for people with print disabilities. Any questions on these services are welcome. Our new Taste of Scarsdale program has featured "What's Cooking at the Firehouse" with local firefighters and "Just Desserts" with Seth Greenberg. We are excited to continue this popular series.

Finally, we are very pleased to announce that we now include MoMA passes as part of the Museum Pass Program.

Readers and pre-readers alike are welcome to join. Pre-readers are awarded prizes for books read to them. Register online, then come to the library where a "listener" will be waiting to hear about a favorite book and award prizes. We also have weekly raffle drawings of gift cards generously donated by Steve Mandani of Scarsdale's Haagen Dazs Ice Cream. Mr. Mandani has donated gift cards for many years, and we appreciate his contributions. The Library also raffles gift baskets of books and other fun goodies.

Reading about what you love fosters a love of reading. Children who love sports will love this summer's theme: "Get in the Game, Read!" It's not required to read only about sports, but it sure is fun! Sports fiction can have elements of history, women's rights, segregation, civil rights, integration, science and social skills. Readers will find themselves in the middle of the action by traveling back in time to meet Babe Ruth in Dan Gutman's series Baseball Card Adventures, or scoring big with titles by Mike Lupica. Author Matt Christopher's series covers a broad range of sports on several reading levels. From Amelia Bedelia at Bat to Pete the Cat, many popular children's book characters play sports with loads of laughs. Our Children's Librarians have prepared new reading lists both for sports fiction and graded reading lists.

Books by and about famous athletes can also be found at the Library. Many of the fiction books written by the authors are based on true events from their childhood. They include: Derek Jeter, Tiki and Rondel Barber, Mia Hamm, George Foreman, and Eli and Peyton Manning, just to name a few.
