From the President

As 2011 draws to a close and we look ahead to the start of a new year, it seems appropriate to take a moment to reflect on the activities and accomplishments of the past few months. For the Friends of the Library, that means first and foremost reporting on the success of our annual Book Sale in September.

We're pleased to report that total sales this year were tantalizingly close to an almost unimaginable \$50,000. Clearly, much as we all love our e-readers, we also find it hard to resist the appeal of a nearly new hardcover copy of, say, *The Help*, for the bargain price of \$3.50! So thank you, everyone, for your fabulous donations (a record number of books and other items came in this year, many in beautiful condition), and then for coming to shop once the sale was on. We thank our Book Sale manager, Kathy Steves, for her extraordinary leadership, her excellent organizational and planning capabilities and her unparalleled knowledge of books. And we also deeply appreciate our extremely dedicated book sale volunteers, many of whom worked close to 40-hour weeks over the summer helping us sort donations, and then logged more long hours in September preparing for and running the sale. In all, an amazing group effort. By the way, start stockpiling your donations for next year's book sale – we'll begin collecting them next July, which will be here before we know it!

The money raised from the Book Sale is put to many uses, as you will see reading through this newsletter, but I would like to highlight just one for now: our biannual "Swinging Sunday" jazz concert series. The most recent concert took place on Sunday, October 30, when the Friends of the Library sponsored a performance by the incredible singer and songwriter Amanda McBroom. You may recall that an anomalous weather event had just occurred in the northeast that weekend and many residents were without power that day. Despite that inconvenient snowstorm (or perhaps to escape their cold, dark homes), a good crowd was on hand to be entertained, and it was a truly special performance, made more so by Ms. McBroom's composure in the face of a sudden loss of power at the library half way through her show! She barely faltered, the music continued, the crowd was able to forget their worries for an hour and an excellent time was had by all. If you missed it, mark your calendars for the next Swinging Sunday jazz concert at 4:00 on April 22, 2012 (Earth Day!), when we will welcome Laura Hull back to Scarsdale. We

can't promise you the same weather excitement, but we're certain it will be a terrific event.

This will greatly enhance the programs and meetings.

Our thanks to the Friends of the Scarsdale Library; the Spelling Bee Committee (an amalgam of Friends and other community leaders); and our library director and staff, for a wonderful 2011.

From the Library Director

Where does the time go? It seems we are all asking that question at this time of year. As I look back over the months since the last Bookmarks, I realize that it was time well spent here at the library.

We are so pleased that we were able to upgrade the audio/visual equipment in the Scott Room, thanks to the Friends of the Scarsdale Library. We added a blu-ray DVD player, a new projector, improved presentation equipment and sound enhancements. I hope you will have a chance to enjoy these improvements by attending programs and events in the coming months.

The Friends of the Scarsdale Library also purchased the wonderful outdoor café tables and chairs on the library plaza. I hope you had a chance to relax, read, snack, chat or use your laptop in the beautiful outdoor setting this summer and fall.

While not as noticeable, we are also thrilled that our antiquated HVAC unit was replaced this fall. This project was partially funded by a NYS Construction Grant, a NYS Community Capital Assistance Program grant supported by Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, and the Friends of the Scarsdale Library. Having a reliable, energy-efficient heating and cooling system means greater comfort for all our visitors and staff.

In addition to all the physical improvements, we have been busy providing great programs and events. Our Summer Reading Game was a great success, as were the other summer programs for children, most of which were sponsored by the Friends of the Scarsdale Library. We could not have had such a fun summer without their support!

We also had great attendance at our independent film series and Nancy's Book Group. Our Museum Pass Program was expanded during its second year and many of you are taking advantage of this fantastic program, funded by the Friends of the Scarsdale Library.

Our online services, Freegal and Overdrive Advantage, are becoming ever more popular. Freegal is a service that allows Scarsdale Library cardholders to download up to three songs per week. The content on Overdrive, the subscription service for downloadable audiobooks and e-books, is now downloadable to Kindles. We know that all the changes in technology can be a bit overwhelming, so we offered "e-Book Day" in December to help our patrons learn how to take advantage of Overdrive. Check out "*Borrowing E-books*" below and visit our website to learn more.

Looking ahead to 2012, we have great things in the works. Keep an eye out for the unveiling of our Strategic Plan, which provides a road map for the next five years. The Scarsdale community spoke, we listened and now we will be working to make sure we are giving you the library you desire, now and in the future.

The Buzz about the Adult and Teen Spelling Bee

Are you an unparalleled orthographer with a penchant for bacchanalia? Then it's time to put your currency where your orifice is and enter the Scarsdale Adult and Teen Spelling Bee!

Hundreds of people of all ages will once again swarm to the Scarsdale High School auditorium for the second annual Scarsdale Library Adult and Teen Spelling Bee on January 27, 2012 at 7:30pm. (Snow date: Feb. 3.) While "silence and tension" are the hallmarks of children's spelling bees, this Spelling Bee, sponsored by the Friends of the Scarsdale Library, will encourage all participants to laugh, relax and have fun. The audience will be entertained by trivia questions, music, and emcee Ed Coleman, the radio voice of the New York Mets. An esteemed panel that includes NYS Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, Scarsdale Mayor Miriam Levitt Flisser and Teen Advisory Board member Jamie Tanzer will judge the bee teams.

Proceeds from this year's Spelling Bee, which is sponsored by the Friends of the Scarsdale Library, are slated toward enlivening the Library's Children's Room with brighter lighting and colorful, durable carpeting that will help create a warmer, more comfortable environment for children and their caregivers.

Donations from last year's Bee plus a grant from the Friends of the Library have enabled the Library to complete the technology upgrades to the community room. Library patrons are now enjoying Wi-Fi and, by January, will benefit from a new projector, a larger screen, and surround sound. Adults and children who attend films at the Library will now enjoy amazingly vivid resolution and wonderful sound. This upgrade will also greatly enhance the many programs held in the room by community organizations, the Scarsdale Adult School, and the Library itself. The new equipment includes wireless microphones so presenters can move freely around the stage and the room, and a remote control so Power Point presentations and video clips can be controlled from the podium.

Each member of the winning team will receive a Kindle Fire tablet and there will also be prizes for the other three teams who make it to the final round, as well as raffle prizes for audience members. Our current roster of teams includes teens from the Library's Teen Advisory Board and from the Scarsdale Teen Center board as well as both new and returning adult teams. Library Board President Barbara Josselsohn will compete against her daughter Rachel, while three generations of Guggenheimers (Randy, Randy Jr. and Brian) will once again compete as a team.

There is still time for your team to sign up and join in the fun. The deadline is December 31. Each team may consist of up to three members, high-school age or above, and pays an entry fee of \$150. During the Bee, team members may collaborate among themselves on how to spell the words. Each team will write its answer on a dry erase board until the final round, when the top teams will spell their words verbally.

Teen Advisory Board

The Scarsdale Public Library's Teen Advisory Board (TAB) has been busy this year planning more teen events at the library. The TAB just successfully sponsored its first annual NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month) write-in, an event that encourages participants to begin writing novels on November 1st and strive for 50,000 words by the end of the month by writing a little bit each day. Opening on Veteran's Day solely to accommodate students who love to write, the library was dedicated to providing students a supportive environment conducive to the sharing of ideas and the discussion of their writing. Students were able to progress further in their stories, benefiting from the focused intensity around them and having other young writers on hand to read their work. The TAB is already in the midst of planning more events for the Spring, including a second annual Teen Writer's Conference where students can participate in writing workshops lead by professional writers.

Borrowing E-books

As you've probably heard, among the hottest categories for gift giving this year are e-book readers and tablets. Naturally, we're doing everything we can to help our patrons stay current with the latest reading technologies.

Our goal is to work with all our patrons to help everyone take full advantage of the Library's growing collection of downloadable books. Toward that end, the Library has acquired a selection of e-reader devices: an Apple iPad, a Barnes and Noble Nook, an Amazon Kindle and a Sony Reader. We're using them to help you learn more about e-readers and how to easily download library books to these devices. We're also eager to help guide you to information about the pros and cons of an ever growing list of new devices.

If you already own an e-reader, you can call us or stop by for advice on how to make it work with our Library's e-book collection. And while the Westchester Library System is continually expanding its e-book collection, the Scarsdale Library is adding extra copies and titles to its electronic collection that are available exclusively to Scarsdale Library cardholders.
